NABA SUMMER BUTTERFLY CENSUS

Saint Paul Audubon's Butterfly Census

***Tentative: Saturday, June 27, 2015**

9:45 AM to 2:00 PM

Dean Hansen will again be our leader for Saint Paul Audubon's annual Butterfly Count. Dave Crawford and "Mo" Whalen will add their expertise. If you want to gain more knowledge about butterflies, you'll have plenty of opportunity!

The count will take place at the Arden Hills Army Training Site (AHATS). The Army has built a new building *inside* the Training Site with toilets that we may use during the count. Since this is an Army facility, we must give the National Guard the names of all participants before the count. Because of EPA regulations, no one under age 18 may participate.

What to Bring & Wear: Come prepared to carpool with others. Be sure to bring plenty of cool drinks, snacks, and a bag lunch. A wide-brimmed hat, light-weight long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, sunscreen, high socks, old sneakers or rubber boots for bog-tromping, and insect repellent are recommended. You may want to bring a camera, butterfly field guide, a butterfly net. There is also quite an interesting bird list for AHATS; you may wish to bring binoculars and a field guide.

Saint Paul Audubon pays the NABA Census fee, so this count is free to all. Registered participants will meet in the parking lot of the new Army building on Hamline Avenue, north of Highway 96 by 9:45 AM. We will **carpool** to the butterfly count sites. A map and information packet will be mailed to registered participants the week before the count.

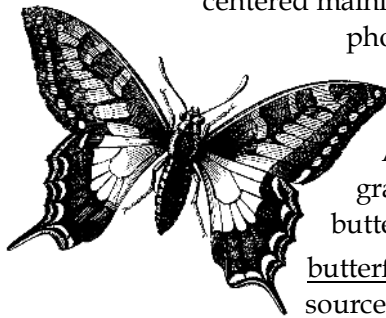

Bird, butterflies, and other pollinators rely on these native plants for their very existence. Mid-July is the best time to view these blooms. Meet leader Chase Davies at Long Lake Regional Park in New Brighton. **DIRECTIONS:** From 35W, exit at Hwy 96, go west. At T with Old Hwy 8, turn left (s). Park entrance is ~ 1/4 mi. on right. Meet in first parking lot on right side of entry road.

Gardeners Can Help

Gardeners can help birds survive by choosing native plants for their gardens, especially those that attract the insects birds need to feed nestlings. A booklet produced by the Saint Paul Audubon Society shows how to have a lovely garden that supports wild creatures.

As birds and other wildlife are increasingly displaced by human activities, native plant gardens become important mini-refuges. Native plants attract native insects, the food source for 96 percent of songbird nestlings. The booklet is free and available at green and garden expos, garden shows and seminars, as well as from the organizations that are its sponsors: SPAS, Audubon Minnesota, Out Back Nursery and Landscaping, and Wild Ones.

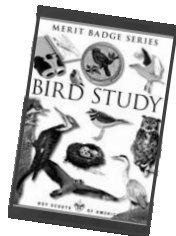
“Working” with Youth
