Native Bees: What do They do for Us, and What Can We do for Them?

With **Elaine Evans**, Entomologist, University of Minnesota

October 11, 2012

Bees provide essential pollination services for many

plants, both wild and commercial. These plants in turn provide countless animals, including us, with food, shelter, and other essentials. Honey bees are the most familiar pollinator but native bees also provide important pollination services. Loss of native bees is a serious concern. Knowledge of basic bee biology will help determine simple steps that can be taken to promote nesting habitat and food sources for native bees.

Elaine Evans has been studying native bees

Recent Changes in Minnesota Bird Life

With **Bob Janssen**, 'The Birdman of Minnesota'

November 8, 2012

Bob Janssen has been described as a "Birding Superhero" and as "The Birdman of Minnesota." One might also call him "Minnesota's citizen bird scientist," since in 2009, he completed an 11-year study of 72

Minnesota State Parks, and developed a bird list for each location. These lists are located on the Dept. of Natural Rescources website, at www.dnr.state.mn.us.

Bob has documented 427 Minnesota birds by sight and sound, and keeps a prodigious list of the birds he has encountered in all 87 Counties in the state.

Bob's interest in where birds occur in Minnesota led him to co-author the 1975 edition of "Birds in Minnesota" with Jan Green, of Duluth. Since then he has written two complete updates. In 2003, he co-authored the Minnesota portion of the "Birds of Minnesota and Wisconsin."

Bob also started a Bird Club (so he could meet other birders from around the state), served as President of the Minnesota Ornithologists' Union, was the editor of the MOU journal "The Loon" for many years, and in retirement, leads classes on birds, notably a shorebird class/field trip to South Dakota's pothole region.



If you went to the Minnesota State Fair this year, perhaps you visited the Eco Experience building. This was my third year volunteering for the Minnesota Renewable Energy Society (MRES) at the Fair.

MRES promotes renewable energy with emphasis on solar energy. As I have previously written, the Earth gets as much energy from the Sun in one hour as we humans use in one year! Solar energy is indeed a very viable source of energy for us and technical advances are made each year in this area. Established companies as well as newer start-ups are approaching our energy needs in very creative ways with continuing advances in solar, wind, wave, tides, algae, biofuels, battery improvements, etc.

BOOK REVIEW

Hawk Ridge: Minnesota's Birds of Prey


Today, as I was outside in my garden, the local Redshouldered Hawks were overhead, circling in the deep blue, calling their "ke-e-ar" notes, talking about, what?

I imagine their conversation... "Is it time yet, dad?"

"keee-arrr.... No, son, not yet. Go look for one of Holly's mice, she's got enough for all..."

"ke-e-ar.... Aw, Dad!"

So, when I went inside, I opened Laura Erickson's new book



about Hawk Ridge's raptor migration. I looked up Redshouldered Hawk in anticipation of hearing of the hundreds of their beautifully-plumaged silhouettes wheeling overhead, wowing visitors at the Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory. The annual average is... 3! (Their habitat mostly occurs south of Lake Superior.) Earliest date: August 25, Latest date: November 10. Peak: October (at the Ridge. At my house? Late, late November and in warmer winters perhaps not at all...)

I recall many visits to Hawk Ridge where the spotters called out the more unusual migrants. I was once there on a thriller of a warm, sunny day when 9-10,000 Broadwinged Hawks went over... Which calls to mind this quote from the Introduction in 'Hawk Ridge':

"When in 1951 local ornithologist Jack Hofslund and the Duluth Bird Club organized counts of the raptors passing over the ridge, ornithologists throughout the nation were astounded by the magnitude of the migration, the size of which had never been documented away from the coasts. Not even the world-famous Hawk Mountain in Pennsylvania approached Hawk Ridge's numbers of raptors, especially Broad-winged Hawks and Northern Goshawks."

The technical aspects of this book: an explanation of how thermals work, why migration occurs along the North Shore of Lake Superior, how the spotters tally the birds, etc., are among the best I've read, anywhere. The species accounts are fascinating, and accurate. The illustrations are sublime, just as they were in the previous collaboration between Laura and Betsy, "Twelve Owls." Each of the 20 species accounts open with a full-page color painting of the bird, and there are smaller pen and ink illustrations that help ID the birds. Just seeing the magnificent painting on the cover was a wonderful thing!
