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Volunteers Needed for Como Woodlands Restoration June 8

A new round of restoration work at Como Woodlands has been scheduled, building on the work accomplished by Saint Paul Audubon volunteers in October. The task, scheduled for June 8 from 5:30-7:30 p.m., will be focused on removing invasive species. Como Woodlands is adjacent to Audubon Woods, a ten-acre-site that was dedicated to Saint Paul Audubon in 1952 and is in need of restoration and care. The work area is somewhat hilly and the work will be physically demanding but volunteers are welcome for a variety of jobs. Here are the details:

The census will again take place at the Arden Hills Army Training Site (AHATS) from 9:45 am to 2:00 pm. *Great news:* Dean Hansen, our amazing and entertaining butterfly expert, will again be our leader. A map and information packet will be mailed to registered participants the week before the count. Registrants will be contacted if weather causes a last-minute change.

HOW TO GET THERE Registered participants will meet in the parking lot at the AHATS Arden Hills Readiness Center, 4761 Hamline Avenue North, just north of Highway 96. Drive through the AHATS gate to the Readiness Center, the first building on the left after you enter the training site. Restrooms are available in the Readiness Center.

DURING THE COUNT We will **carpool** to the various sites. Mary Lee, the Environmental Protection


WHAT TO BRING AND WEAR Be sure to bring plenty of cool drinks, snacks, and a bag lunch. A wide-brimmed hat, lightweight long pants, and a long-sleeved shirt (for protection from Deer Ticks, sun, and sharp grasses), sunscreen, high socks, old sneakers or rubber boots for bog-tromping, and insect repellent are recommended. You'll want to bring binoculars, a camera, a butterfly field guide, and a butterfly net. We'll have some extra butterfly nets and identification sheets. There are also many interesting summer birds at AHATS and we are fortunate that Ellen Lowery will be joining us to identify and count the birds seen and heard.

RECOMMENDED BUTTERFLY FIELD GUIDE

Birds, Bogs and Bantams

This private 20-acre homestead located just north of Scandia includes a terrific variety of habitat (hardwood, prairie, wetland, open water, bog) as well as bird feeders that are bound to run up the day's bird count. For those who are interested, our hosts will top off the field trip with a demonstration of their hobby beekeeping and bantam chicken operations. It should be a fun and productive morning.

SUGGESTIONS Wear comfortable closed-toe shoes for hiking and comfortable clothing and layers appropriate for the weather. Use sun protection. Bring water bottle, insect repellent, field guide and binoculars.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS Drive time from Rosedale Shopping Center 45 minutes at the speed limit. Drive north on I-35 to exit 129 for MN97. Follow MN97 through Forest Lake. Continue east on MN97 to Scandia (approximately 11 miles from I35). Turn left (north) onto Olinda Trail N. Travel 1.9 miles to Pilar Rd. N. Turn right. Travel 0.2 miles. Driveway on left (this is the first house on the left (north) side of the street). Turn around in the driveway and park along the north side of Pilar Rd. Short walk along the driveway to the house.

Birds seen were geese, ducks, turkeys, cormorants, herons, pigeons, doves, woodpeckers, flycatchers, vireos, warblers, crows, swallows, nuthatches, kinglets, blackbirds, orioles, sparrows. Meanwhile City Parks have designed a park access road, a parking lot and landscape design at the trail head. Work will begin in Fall 2022.

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Warbler Weekend Highlights

More people than birds were accounted for at the 50th Warbler Weekend in May. Registered attendees came to 135 people, while bird species added up to 104. Fourteen warbler species were identified, which is also fewer than usual. A cold spring and storms along migration routes were



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speculated to be part of the problem, even though the weather in Lake City that weekend was perfectly sunny and warm. Three days later, back in the Twin Cities, birders were reporting record numbers of warbler species!

Still, everyone had a great time socializing and birding, including 20 members of the Urban Bird Collective, whose costs for attending were supported with a grant from the Saint Paul Audubon Society. Monica Bryand, founder of the collective, says "The Urban Bird Collective wants to give a big shout out to Saint Paul Audubon for providing support to BIPOC folks interested in birding. While the warblers forgot



Fourth-Graders Wild About Wild River Journey

Fourth-graders from a variety of St. Croix River Valley schools learned about birding and how to use binoculars on ten Wild River Journey field trips in May. The students rode the river on large paddlewheel boats leaving from Taylors Falls or Stillwater, while rotating among three "stations" called Birds & Binoculars; Log Jam: A Tree's Journey; and What is a Watershed. Thank you to the 21 Saint Paul Audubon volunteers who ran the birding station. Chase Davies, with Saint Paul Audubon, organized the Stillwater volunteers; and Dann Adair and Tom Anderson, from Wild River Audubon, recruited the Taylors Falls volunteers. The experience of watching young folks learn how to use binoculars and hearing them call out the birds and everything else they saw along the river was a joy.

The Saint Paul Audubon Society was a co-creator of the Wild River Journey field trip experience, along with the National Park Service's St. Croix National Scenic Riverway (SCNSR); Wild River Conservancy, the official Friends group for SCNSR; and the Wild River Audubon Society. The original program occurred in 2020, just before Covid hit. This year about 400 fourth-graders, along with teachers and chaperones, participated between May 3 and 25.
